



When you pause for a moment and stare at nothing, your eyes turn inward. There lie pictures beyond the windows above the trees, and open sky. An empty black filled with stories.






After trying to put my feelings about art into words, I came to the understanding of why I'm in visual arts and not English. Expressing oneself takes on many forms. This is the best way I know.




