

Studying Visual Arts at Grenfell

VISUAL ARTS BACHELOR OF FINE ARTS (BFA)

The Visual Arts Program at Grenfell Campus is an immersive studio-based, four-year degree program in contemporary art. Our faculty are established artists and art historians who will support you in your journey to find the materials, processes, and practices that best suit your artistic vision.

Our facilities include a printshop with intaglio, relief, screen printing and lithography; a sculpture studio with a metal shop, wood shop, and ceramics; large, ventilated studios for textiles, painting, drawing and interdisciplinary practices; a traditional darkroom and fully colour managed digital facility, scanners and large format printers; and a Mac lab with sound, video and imaging software.

Grenfell Campus Art Gallery regularly hosts visiting national and international exhibitions as well as an annual exhibition of 4th year student work. Our Visual Arts program has an optional 12-week summer immersion program in Harlow, England where you'll take daily field trips to important cultural sites in the UK and receive credits towards your degree. You may also take advantage of our experiential learning opportunities such as the summer co-operative printmaking course at St. Michael's Printshop in St. John's.

The Art Gallery

Grenfell Campus Art Gallery, established in 1988, is committed to providing a stimulating educational forum through diverse programming in the visual arts. We are committed to providing an interpretive educational gallery through research, interpretation and exhibition of contemporary and historical art from around the world. We also maintain an active program of collections and conservation of art. The Gallery is spacious, climate controlled and secure, with moveable temporary walls. Visitors are welcome. We're located in the Fine Arts Building.








